For the first time, national student leaders from NSNA (nursing), AMSA (medicine), AOTA (occupational therapy), SNPhA (pharmacy), and SAAAPA (physician's assistants) came together in Washington D.C. to lobby for *Student Debt* and *Title 7*, in one united voice.
