## AMERICAN MEDICAL STUDENT ASSOCIATION HOUSE OF DELEGATES 2017 RESOLUTION: A8

INTRODUCED BY: Kelly Thibert DO, MPH, National President;

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SCHOOL: Nova Southeastern University College of Osteopathic Medicine Principles regarding the use of illegal drugs, alcohol and tobacco SUBJECT: Resolution of Principles TYPE: WHEREAS cannabis/marijuana has been used medicinally for centuries, even being prescribed by physicians in the United States until 1937<sup>1</sup>; and WHEREAS "marijuana" prohibition began with the Marijuana Tax Act of 1937<sup>1</sup> not secondary to any public health concerns but rather concerns over the business industry; and WHEREAS it has been shown that medical marijuana is effective in treating a wide range of symptoms in a variety of conditions including but not limited to control of nausea and vomiting, promotion of weight gain, seizures, painful peripheral neuropathy, and muscle spasticity<sup>2, 3, 4,5</sup>: and WHEREAS there has not been a reported fatal overdose with cannabis; and WHEREAS we have read reports, such as the one from the Surgeon General<sup>6</sup>, regarding the issues with opioids, yet we still need alternatives to treatment for patients; and WHEREAS there are several states paving the pathway for the use of medical marijuana who are consistently reporting data regarding patient use and public health concerns<sup>7</sup>; and WHEREAS We being the innovative voices in the medical community should be open minded enough to listen to patients and public health departments in terms of advancing medicine; **THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED** that the Principles Regarding the use of illegal drugs, alcohol and tobacco (pp 47-50) be amended by ADDITION to state: 27. In regard to medical marijuana:

a. RECOGNIZES that there is support for the medical use of marijuana and advocates that

usage be based on high quality, patient-centered, evidence-based research.

31 b. RECOGNIZES the need for further studies into the use of medical marijuana and related 32 compounds. 33 34 c.
