WHEREAS The morbidity and mortality related to opioid addiction and overdose is dramatically increasing, and;

WHEREAS Medication assisted treatment (MAT) has proven to result in decreased use of illicit opioids, reduction of other illicit drug use, and decreased risk behavior linked to HIV and Hepatitis C. Furthermore, during pregnancy, MAT has been associated with decreased pregnancy complications and improved fetal outcomes^{1,2}, and;

WHEREAS Naloxone access laws vary between states, and;

WHEREAS Naloxone has a long history of safe and effective use, and;

WHEREAS Providing opioid overdose training and naloxone kits to laypersons who might witness an opioid overdose can help reduce opioid overdose mortality³, and;

WHEREAS Many prescription drugs, including opioids, have the potential for misuse and abuse and can be frequently found in many homes despite being expired or no longer being used by the patient they were prescribed to. Improper or lack of disposal of these medications can result in misuse.

THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED that the Principles Regarding The Use of Illegal Drugs, Alcohol, And Tobacco (p 46-50) be AMENDED to state:

- 23. SUPPORTS medication assisted treatment (MAT) for opioid use disorder treatment including during pregnancy while URGING more physicians to become trained and certified in treating opioid use disorder.
- 24. ENCOURAGES the increased education and training of, but not limited to, laypersons and first responders on recognizing and preventing opioid related overdose.
- 25. SUPPORTS increasing the availability of naloxone to decrease opioid overdose related morbidity and mortality.

- 29 26. SUPPORTS continued and expanded drug take-back day initiatives as a way of providing a responsible and convenient method for disposal of prescription drugs, including but not limited to opioids, while
