12 13 14	WHEREAS in 2019, the FBI reported 663,367 cannabis arrests and citations. This is more arrests than for all violent crimes combined. FBI data showed that police only cleared 33% of rapes, 31% of robberies, and 14% of burglaries by making an arrest [1].
15 16 17 18 19	WHEREAS according to the FBI, there have been more than 15 million cannabis arrests in the U.S. since 1995. While cannabis consumers who were not convicted have gone on to be President or Supreme Court Justice, a criminal conviction can stand in the way of securing a job getting housing, or receiving a professional license, student loan, food assistance, or driver's license [1].
20 21 22	WHEREAS according to the ACLU, Black individuals are more than 3.5 times as likely to be arrested for cannabis possession than white individuals nationwide, despite similar rates of use [1].
23 24 25	WHEREAS illicit cannabis growers sometimes use banned pesticides, divert waterways, and leave hazardous waste in state and national parks. Regulated cannabis businesses are monitored to ensure compliance with zoning and environmental laws [2].
26 27 28	WHEREAS cannabis is safer than alcohol. Researchers have concluded that cannabis is less toxic than alcohol, it has less potential for addiction, and it is less likely to contribute to serious medical problems [2].
29 30	WHEREAS traffic deaths and arrests for DUIs do not increase, and may decrease, wher marijuana is legalized. Traffic deaths dropped 11% on average in states that legalized medica

- 31 marijuana. Arrests for driving under the influence have decreased in Washington and Colorado
- 32 [3].
- THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED that the (Principles Regarding Healthcare in the Criminal
- Justice System) (pg. 170) be **AMENDED BY ADDITION** to state:
