11 12	WHEREAS with a traditional ballot, also known as plurality voting, the candidate with the most votes wins, even if that candidate does not win over 50% of the votes [1].
13 14 15 16 17	WHEREAS ranked-choice voting, also known as ranked voting or preferential voting, is an election voting system in which voters rank candidates in order of preference on the ballot. If none of the candidates receive a majority of first-choice votes, the last-place candidate is eliminated, and their votes are distributed to their voters' second-choice candidates. This process is repeated until one of the candidates collects more than half of the votes [1].
18 19 20 21	WHEREAS research suggests that ranked-choice voting encourages more candidates to enter races, especially female and minority candidates. Candidates who may be unpopular no longer have to feel discouraged from entering races and potentially 'taking votes away' from another candidate with similar views who may be more favored [1].
22 23 24	WHEREAS while critics of ranked-choice voting state that this system delays outcomes and confuses voters, according to exit polls conducted by FairVote, voters who participated in ranked-choice elections reported that they understood the process [2].
25 26 27 28	WHEREAS as of May 2021, 21 jurisdictions used ranked-choice voting, including: Berkeley, California; Cambridge, Massachusetts; Las Cruces, New Mexico; Minneapolis, Minnesota; New York City; Oakland, California; Portland, Maine; San Francisco, California; Santa Fe, New Mexico; and St. Paul, Minnesota [2].
